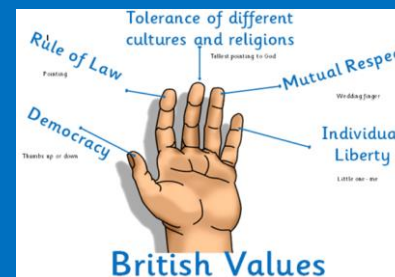

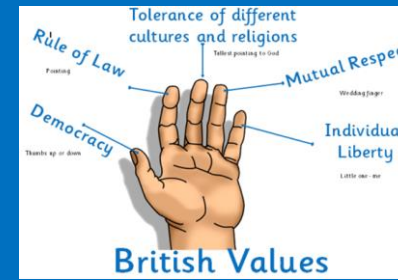

DARK winter days have been brightened up for pupils at one school in Telford following a donation of high visibility jackets.

Students at William Reynolds Primary School and Nursery in Westbourne have been gifted the vests from Shropshire Homes to help keep students safe on school trips and outings.

Staff and pupils at the school, near Ironbridge, have received 60 vests which will be used on the 10 school trips the school organises every term.

This comes after the housebuilder is working on the former Beeches Hospital site near to the school where it is transforming a former 19th century workhouse into luxury homes.

The Beeches development will see 35 new homes constructed within the Grade II listed building which has been saved from falling into disrepair.

Liam Frith, The Beeches' site manager, said:

When you are kind, you make the world a happier, safer place.

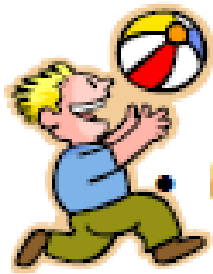
You can be kind to everyone - to people who are just like you and to people who are different to you.
