#### Global Awareness Day: Black History


In the UK, Black History Month falls in October each year and celebrates Black history and heritage. We recognise that Black history




For Black History Month Y2 focused on the life and work of Nelson Mandela and the impact he had upon the world.



#### Children In Need - 17th November


The children at William Reynolds Primary School and Nursery came to school dressed in spots to celebrate children in need. They learnt about where the money raised was spent and how this benefitted others.

#### Congratulations

Congratulations to Mrs Jones, our Base 1 teacher, who won a silver veteran individual kata at the FEW European Wadokai championships in Belgium!



#### Mrs Jones shared her experience:



On Sunday 6th November, I competed in Leige, Belgium at the 48th FEW European Wadokai Championships in the veteran category in kata. My kata was strong and technically very good. This time I beat Norway and came close to gold gaining a silver and becoming a European finalist for the second time - one up from last year. Being up on the European stage was such an indescribable feeling and I will be aiming to be selected for Cyprus next year with the hope that I can go to World's at the Budokan in Japan in 2025. I urge everyone to give things a go without making excuses. I believe if I can do it... so can everyone!

Since returning from the competition, Mrs Jones has even gone on to pass her exam as a 1<sup>st</sup> dan blackbelt of Wadokai.

#### Year 5 - Base 12



At the end of the autumn term, Miss Walmsley will be leaving us for a short time to go on maternity leave. Mrs Rachel Nash, who has worked at our school for many years will be taking responsibility for teaching Base 12 until Miss Walmsley returns. We have planned in lots of opportunities so far this half term to allow Mrs Nash to work alongside the teaching staff in Base 12 so that there is a smooth transition for the children.

#### **Author Visit**

#### Year 1

On Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> October, Year 1 were visited by author Sarah Griffiths. The children enjoyed hearing Sarah read her book 'Tom's Gift' which she brought to life for them. They also took part in a mini music workshop where they had the opportunity to learn the accompanying song 'Sing As You Go'. The song was performed by local children from HLC Primary School Choir, and the children joined in whilst performing the actions.













Year 3

Sarah Griffiths, a local children's author, visited year 3 to share her story Tom's Gift. She told us how she came up with the ideas for her story based on her life and the music she would listen to. Sarah also answered questions from the children about when she became and author and how she practised her story writing from an early age. The children enjoyed interacting with the story and singing the song from the book.

#### Gymnastics - Wrekin College

Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> November saw a group of 10 children from years 2, 3 and 4 heading off with Mr Tagg and Miss Chambers for an afternoon of gymnastics at Wrekin College.

The event was being organised by Telford and Wrekin School Sports Partnership and was meant to be a fun afternoon where the children could develop their own gymnastic skills alongside children from different schools across the borough.

Children were given specific routines to practise and complete on both the floor and the vault. Both exercises were familiar to the children as they have already had the chance to learn and develop them in our own school curriculum, before performing them as part of their house competitions.

It was fantastic to see so many children, especially our own, growing in confidence throughout the afternoon. The event culminated in an opportunity for every child to demonstrate their new skills in



front of the other children, as lots of children performed their routines and vaults at the same time.



Twycross Zoo - Year 1

On Thursday 12<sup>th</sup> October, Year One went on a visit to Twycross Zoo. We had a wonderful day visiting all the animals that we had been learning about in school. We saw flamingos, penguins, rhinos, giraffes, monkeys and many more. As part of our visit, we also went on the Gruffalo Discovery Land Trail and met lots of the characters from the popular children's story book along the way. The children all had a fabulous time and produced some lovely pieces of writing about our day!

#### Year 4 - Anglo Saxon Workshop

Year 4 had a visit from Oswald the Angle. He came to tell the children about his life as an Anglo-Saxon. Throughout the day, the children found out about everyday life as an Anglo-Saxon. They learnt about their food, their homes, their everyday life and even how they fought their battles.

During the day, the children had the opportunity to re-enact a famous battle between the Mercian armies of King Penda and the Northumbrian armies of King Oswald. The battle was eventually won by the army of King Penda who became the Bretwalda (Emperor King). As he had promised before the battle began, King Penda cut Oswald's body up into pieces and scattered it among the branches of a tree. The spot where his body was cast became famous for its healing waters as became known as Oswald's Tree (Oswestry).

































Year 1 - Woodside Walk

As part of their theme 'Our World', Year 1 have been learning about their local area of Woodside and Telford, and the United Kingdom.

To familiarise themselves with their surroundings, they went on a walk around Woodside on Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> November 2023. This was a great opportunity for the children to look around the local area and see what was available to them nearby. The children had a great time recognising the local shops and doctors, and the park where they play!


















#### Attendance

We are continuing to work hard on improving our attendance across school.


#### Best Attendance from September 2023 to November 2023:

Well done to Base 4 with 98.67% arriving on time.







Does my child need to stay at home?



together to explore




















































#### Subject Spotlight: Mathematics





#### Our three principle aims following the National Curriculum in England for Mathematics are:


- For all children to be fluent in the fundamentals of mathematics

As part of their Mastering Number work , Year 2 are using a rekenrek daily - the children love using them and its making a real difference to their learning.


A rekenrek is a counting frame, similar to an abacus. It has ten beads on each row, five white and five red which supports the




development of number sense. It was initially developed by Adrian Treffers at the Freudenthal Institute in the Netherlands, the word rekenrek translates from Dutch as 'calculating frame'.










#### Challenge:





#### Early Years—Diwali

learning more about the Vikings!















hard in Victorian England, but the sweets from Pritchard's Sweetshop were amazina!













#### Headlice Reminder

Please can we ask all parents to regularly check their child's hair for headlice.

Did you know that ...

Head lice and nits are very common in young children and their families. They do not have anything to do with dirty hair and are picked up by head-to-head contact.





Head lice are small insects. They can be difficult to spot in your hair.

Head lice eggs (nits) are brown or white (empty shells) and attached to the hair.



#### Head lice can make your head feel:

- itchy
- · like something is moving in your hair

The only way to be sure someone has head lice is by finding live lice. You can do this by combing their hair with a special fine -toothed comb (detection comb).

#### How to get rid of head lice:

- Treat head lice as soon as you spot them.
- You should check everyone in the house and start treating anyone who has head lice on the same day.

#### Wet combing:

Lice and nits can be removed by wet combing. You should try this method first.

You can buy a special fine-toothed comb (detection comb) online or from pharmacies to remove head lice and nits.

There may be instructions on the pack, but usually you: wash hair with ordinary shampoo

apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do)

comb the whole head of hair, from the roots to the ends

Do wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that everyone's hair is free of lice on day 17.

## How to get rid of head lice: Medicated lotions and sprays

Ask a pharmacist for advice.


They may recommend using medicated lotions and sprays. These kill head lice in all types of hair, and you can buy them from pharmacies, supermarkets or online.

Head lice should die within a day. Some lotions and sprays come with a comb to remove dead lice and eggs.

Some treatments need to be repeated after a week to kill any newly hatched lice.

Check the pack to see if they're OK for you or your child and how to use them.

If lotions or sprays do not work, speak to a pharmacist about other treatments.

#### What is the process of Early Help?

Early Help Assessments (EHA) are used to identify a child and family's needs and strengths, and to plan the right support and services to address those needs at an early stage. The process allows different agencies and services to share information and work together in a coordinated way.

#### What does an early help support worker do?

Early Help is providing support to children, young people and their families as soon as problems start. When a child, young person or the family need some extra support, Early Help is often the first response offered by those services in contact with them.

We all need a bit of support from time to time. If you feel that you would benefit from support, please contact school. We can arrange a meeting with you to complete an Early Help Assessment. Once the referral for Early Help has been made, your family will be allocated a Strengthening Families Practitioner, who will work with you to identify your needs that will be addressed with an Early Help Support Plan.

Strengthening Families are NOT Social Services.


